Sitewide sponsorship – \$50/1,000 pageviews (minimum purchase: 3,000)

Sitewide sponsorships are for content that has to do with broad issues pertaining to government, politics, or public policy. This information appears in rotation with all other sponsorships on the homepage, every list page, every administrative page, and every bill page that has not been sponsored individually.

Sponsorship of individual bills – \$150/week+ then \$10/day (subject to auction)

Individual bill sponsorships are for content that pertains to specific legislation. Sponsorships are sold on a full week basis (Sun.-Sat.), with the days preceding the next full week added on free if the bill is not already sponsored. Once a sponsorship is in place, it can be continued for \$10/day until another sponsor purchases it.

Auction rules for popular bills: When a bill has more than one sponsor by 6:00 p.m. Eastern time on the Thursday preceding the next full week, the sponsorship is subject to auction on a sealed-bid, second-price basis. All bidders submit bids not knowing the bids of any other participant, and the winning bidder pays the second highest bid.
